One of the workers at the port's cruise terminal, a baggage handler, had an accident at his home. He dove into his swimming pool, hit his head, and was later declared brain dead. The doctors removed him from life support the following day. In a matter of minutes he had passed. It was a very sad time for all of us who knew Lionel. He was the glue that kept the other baggage handlers together. He was a counselor to some and a mentor to others. He was always smiling and had a great attitude. He would always get on to the guys for not putting a dollar or more in the basket when I would pass by and hand out water. It is very hot pushing those suitcases, and they deserved a cold bottle of water. We never charge, but it was a kind gesture on his part. Occasionally, I would give him a ride from the parking lot to the terminal, just to save him a few steps that day. I knew he was going to be walking enough as it was. I was not as close to him as his fellow workers, but I do miss seeing him on cruise ship days. I did attend his funeral. It was more

like a celebration or a farewell to a loved one. Lionel was a Christian. That is one of the things we had discussed. His death had tremendous impact on some of the guys. What his death did do, was open the door to talk to some about their salvation. It also opened many doors that I had been trying to open for a while. There were people at his funeral who saw me there and came up and stated how much they were glad to see me. Others came up later at the terminal and stated that they were told I had attended. As I stated earlier, this had given me the opportunity to talk to some of his fellow workers about their salvation. It also has given me the opportunity to talk to some of the Harbor Police about their walk with Christ (or the lack thereof).

One of the officers sat on my bus the next week telling me how much Lionel's death had impacted him. I listened to him and could tell he was upset and just wanted to tell

his story. After he had finished, I looked at him and asked, "You are a police officer, and something could happen to you in a split second. Where would you spend eternity?" His statement was, "I have been thinking about that. I do a lot of good things. I help people as much as I can. I do more good than bad." My reply was, "That is nice. I am sure the people you are doing these things for are glad. But doing good things does not get you into heaven." I tried to explain to him Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace you have been saved in Christ Jesus through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God. Not of your works, lest anyone should boast." He was called away but promised we would talk later. He was at the funeral of Lionel, so he heard the Gospel there and again with me. I planted the seed, now it is up to him whether he wants to pursue the conversation further. I will continue to pray for him and continue to be a friend.




